Suzuki Student Graduation

Current March 2018

Dr Suzuki chose milestone pieces from the violin repertoire that he felt demonstrated accomplishment and skill development. The graduation pieces are not an indication of book completion and are not necessarily the last piece in the book. Over the years each instrument group has chosen its own relevant milestone pieces. Currently, NZSI offers graduation opportunities for Cello, Flute, Guitar, Piano and Violin. The Listeners for NZSI student graduations are NZSI registered trainers and experienced teachers who have undertaken professional development in graduation assessment.

Benefits for participating in Suzuki Graduations Process:

- Nurtures excellence in both students and teachers.
- Collectively raises the standard of instrument playing overall.
- Gives a personal record for posterity.
- Validates the revision/review concept "when children know a piece deeply they can become free to express the music."
- Gives the Suzuki community the opportunity to recognise the accomplishment of the student, i.e. graduation published in the NZSI journal.

Specifics of the Suzuki Graduation Recording:

- ✓ It is recommended that students be one book beyond the graduation level before making their graduation recording.
- ✓ The recording should demonstrate mastery and refinement according to the criteria set for each instrument.
- \checkmark The recording should be a collaborative effort between student and teacher.
- ✓ The private teacher must assure the set criteria is achieved before the recording is submitted. (Teacher's will be required to confirm they have listened to the recording and it meets the criteria.)

If the Listener finds the recording does not meet the required criteria, they will communicate with the private teacher in order to help the teacher to prepare the student thoroughly, and they may invite the teacher and student to make another recording and resubmit this at no extra cost.

When preparing and applying for Student Graduations, please take not of the following:

<u>Deadline Dates:</u>	15 May and <mark>15 September</mark> (deadline will be strictly adhered to in order to facilitate the process.)
<u>Pre-requisites:</u>	Student must be current NZSI members and learning from a NZSI Registered teacher on the instrument of the graduation submission (<u>click here</u> for the current registry)
Cost:	\$30 per student for each level and instrument

Recording: Digital format audio recording is strongly preferred and can be submitted as an audiofile recording(s) in .mp3 format or on a USB drive. Alternatively, recordings can be submitted on CD. All recordings should be posted to NZSI Administrator, PO Box 633, Wellington 6140.

Announcing:The piece should be announced by the performer prior to the recording. The
announcement should include:
The performer name and age (if under 18)
The piece and composer
The teacher's name
And conclude with "Thank you for listening" at the end of the announcement.

1. There are instrument specific criteria for each graduation level that establishes the acceptable standard.

2. Not all of your students may be able to meet the criteria for a given level. Alternatives to submitting a graduation recording might be;

- A. Studio book party
- B. 'In house' graduation recording with teacher supplying feedback and recognition.
- C. Solo or Group performances

3. It is your responsibility to listen to the recording that will be submitted.

- A. Assure the sound quality and volume (including the spoken introduction) are acceptable.
- B. Check the performance meets the criteria for the given level.

4. If you have a student that does not meet the criteria and feel there are mitigating circumstances, please write a note of explanation for the Listener when you confirm the student's graduation submission. *Please note this would be allowed for that particular student only on one occasion

5. If the Listener finds the recording does not meet the criteria the following may happen;

A. The listener may request the recording be made again.

B. The Listener may ask that the teacher does not submit further graduations for that student until they are able to meet the criteria.

6. In some cases the Listener may correspond directly with the teacher beyond the Student Report.

7. For each graduation period, general feedback will be given via the teachers newsletter or journal. It may include statistics, encouragement, reminders etc.

They provide examples of how two assessors responded in slightly different ways to the same performance while utilising the same report structure and piece specific criteria.

Exemplar 1 Violin Level 1 Gossec Gavotte

Thank you for a well prepared performance. You chose an appropriate tempo and overall there was a musical feel to the piece. Well done. Intonation was reliable throughout as was the string crossing. The semi-quavers in bar 20 were good in the repeat, so be sure to continue to work at developing finger fitness by playing scales and finger exercises so they will be secure every time! The pizzicato notes had a clear and ringing tone. An area to work on is more contrast in the tone and dynamics and a slightly faster tempo. Thank you again for an enjoyable performance that demonstrates you are well on the way in your violin learning journey.

Exemplar 2 Violin Level 1 Gossec Gavotte

Thank you, for this very enjoyable performance of Gossec Gavotte. You showed that you have a well-developed bow hold with tidy string crossings and well-prepared bow retakes. The intonation was reliable and you managed most of the semiquavers with clarity and ease. The final pizzicatos were clear and the return to the opening theme was well placed. When you play this piece again you could experiment with a slightly faster tempo – it will be fun to find out how quickly your fingers can manage the fast notes.
